DG JOE'S JOTTINGS.....

Since the October Newsletter much has happened in the District with the second meeting of the District Finance and Management Committee being held in Gladstone on 28 October and the second Annual General Meeting of the District being held at Boyne Island on 4 November. A College of Governors Meeting was also held on 28 October immediately after the District Finance and Management Meeting. DGN Terry reports a 1.8% growth in membership this year.

Attendance at the AGM was exceptional for a District of our geographic size. Thirty-four Clubs (69%) were represented either by attendance or proxy with one Club abstaining, twice that required for a quorum. District Secretary, Rod, has emailed the AGM Minutes to all Clubs and District Officers. If you have not received the Minutes, please contact Secretary Rod Edwards. To those who attended and those who supported the AGM, I thank you.

DGE Greg conducted an Interactive Training Session for Assistant Governors and District Officers on 4 November immediately after the AGM and many AGM attendees chose to stay on for the training seminar. The style of training provided by the District Training team was the first of its type to my knowledge in D9570 and I congratulate DGE Greg, PDG George Golding and PP Ron Wakelin from stepping outside the "norm" or past practice/s on this occasion. The feedback I have received has been positive. I am sure that PETS 2007 will be along similar lines thereby providing the opportunity to all President and Secretary Elects to have input into the District operations 2007-2008.

DGN Terry and Debbie, DGE Greg and Chris, and Denise and I will be attending the 41st Zone 7A and 8A Institute on the Gold Coast from 14 to 19 November. Terry and Greg will, along with Debbie and Chris, receive training which will prepare them for their year as Governor and I will attend the Governor's Forum as well as attend the AGM of those Multi-District Programmes which are held in conjunction with the Institute. RAWCS National and ARCAP are but two of the agenda items for the Governor's Forum, however, I would suggest that they are the two most important agenda items. On 17 October, Denise and I enjoyed the 80th Anniversary celebrations of the Mackay Club with President Tony Vella, Mackay Club members and visiting Rotarians. Group 1 Clubs were well represented on the night and those Clubs sponsored by Mackay also attended. President Tony revealed the new Club logo during the Meeting.

The proposed Friendship Exchanges with D4510 Brazil and D9910 Norfolk Island are progressing well. If you are interested contact Greg Whitmore, Mackay Club for Brazilian exc

FRIENDSHIP EXCHANGE 2007

Outbound—Expressions of interest are being sought from Rotarians and partners from District 9570 to participate in a Rotary Friendship Exchange with District 4510 Brazil. This exchange is to take place from mid May for approximately two weeks. Home hosting and transport will be provided during visits to the District's main centres of Assis, Presidente Prudente, Marilla and Bauru. Your costs would include return airfares to Sao Paulo, plus a short regional flight from Sao Paulo to Bauru and return (approximately \$3.500 AUD per person) plus some personal expenses.

This Rotary program allows Rotarians the opportunity to experience another culture at first hand. Its purpose is the advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through people to people contact across international boundaries.

Three couples would be a conveniently-sized group. While we would like to see the group arrive together, separate arrangements can be made to travel elsewhere after the return to Sao Paulo. Each participant is responsible for travel arrangements and expenses.

INTERACT

In October, Neil Robinson from the Rotary Club of Bundaberg Sunrise travelled with his wife, Claire, to India to establish reliable links for the Interact Club of St Luke's Anglican School. Neil is the School based co-ordinator for the Interact Club sponsored by Bundaberg Sunrise.

Neil was mainly interested in service projects in village and economically disadvantaged schools and prior to his departure had e-mailed District Governors in India to provide assistance in gaining access to these schools. The Rotary clubs in India were very helpful and Neil and Claire were met and taken to a number of schools which the Rotary Clubs in different areas were attempting to assist. Neil and Claire sponsored a number of children to remain at school and also organized for one child to be sponsored by the Interact Club.

These students in need were identified by the head of the village who has close ties with the Rotary Club in India. Other ongoing projects are being considered by the Interact Club and will remain on the agenda as part of International service.

It is hoped that this contact will allow for ongoing support for worthy school projects to assist students with their education. An interact club is being established in the village school of Bhanpur Kalan, Jaipur, in the near future such that the Interact Club of St Luke's can maintain closer ties with the school. Another example of the family of Rotary around the world at work.

D9570 RAWCS Project first of its kind

District Rotarians who attended the 05/06 District Conference in Hervey Bay may recall a presentation by Wide Bay Water Corporation CEO Tim Waldron. A part of that presentation was on an overseas aid project to supply water to the tiny man-made island of Adagege in the Solomon Islands. The Rotary Club of Hervey Bay Sunrise has teamed up with Wide Bay Water as a joint venture to carry out this project. Recently the Rotary Club of Hervey Bay Sunrise was successful in having this project recognized by Rotary Australia World Community Service as an official project identified as Project No. **RAWCS 14/2006-2007**.

The project involves positioning a solar-powered submersible pump in a permanent spring on the main island of Malaita then pumping water from the spring to a 5,000 litre holding tank on top of a 15 meter-high hill near the spring. Water will then be gravity-fed via a pipeline buried on the island of Malaita then anchored to the sea-bed to the island of Adagege approximately 250 metres off shore. A single water tap will then be installed on Adagege to provide clean water for drinking and cooking purposes. Currently all water to the island is carried via canoe and on foot from the spring on a daily basis.

The estimated cost of the project is \$50,000. It is hoped to raise the majority of funds via public appeal in Hervey Bay which is now well underway. Any Clubs interested in making a contribution to the appeal can send a cheque made out to **"RAWCS NR OAF"** to the Rotary Club of Hervey Bay Sunrise, PO Box 703, Hervey Bay Qld 4655.

Wide Bay Water has produced a colourful and informative brochure on the project which is available to all clubs on request.

RAWCS advises that as far as can be determined this is the first time in Australia that a project that is the concept of a private sector company has been taken on as a joint venture with a Rotary Club. A Project Volunteers team of Rotarians from Hervey Bay Sunrise is being formed to travel to the Solomons to assist with the implementation of the project along side technical staff from Wide Bay Water. The installation phase could take place as early as December this year.

Insanity For a Good Cause (2006 Postie Bike Challenge)

On Wednesday 6th September, 52 adventurers (deranged individuals) departed the Brisbane RNA grounds heading for Alice Springs on 'Postie Bikes'.

Yes, that's right – those little red Australia Post motorbikes that deliver your mail. The group included males and females from all states of Australia and New Zealand – and from all walks of life. We probably had a few things in common. We all ride motorbikes, we were all looking for an adventure and of course we were prepared to pay for it.

It all seemed like a good idea until we set eyes on our mounts – they are very small and look way too flimsy to travel 3200 kms. across some of the worst roads to Australia's centre. The first 2000km were travelled on bitumen, which would seem to be pretty easy – and I guess it was except that these bikes only average about 70kph – on the flat! We camped out each night at some interesting towns – Jandowae, Nindigully, Charleville and Windorah. That was when the bitumen ran out. Next came Birdsville, an excursion to Big Red, then north to Bedourie and Boulia.

The road then turned a bit ugly (at least for postie bikes but ok for 4x4's and road trains) as we hit (in some cases literally) the Donohue "Highway" on our way to Tobermorey Station on the NT border. By now we had discovered that the little bikes we were straddling don't much care for stones and corrugations, hate sand and have zero tolerance to bulldust – and we had 1200km of all the above. Falling off was becoming fairly common with increasing injuries over the next two days – some serious enough (broken collar bones, ribs and legs) to incur four Flying Doctor evacuations. If the Donohue was bad the Plenty 'Highway' was a shocker most of the way to Gem Tree, our final night on the road (where we passed the hat around and raised \$700 for the Flying Doctors – the least we could do). By now most of us had some 'war wounds' to remind ourselves of what we had endured.

Our final half-day on bitumen to the Alice was bliss. Each night we were catered to by local groups or service clubs and looked after very well (they each picked up about \$2000 for their efforts).

On arrival at the Alice Springs Resort, Rotary were there to greet us and be our hosts for dinner, breakfast and at Henley on Todd the next day. The end of the trip was quite emotional for most of the "Challengers" – we had all put up with incredibly difficult riding conditions on silly little bikes, were feeling pretty bruised and battered and had experienced 10 days of amazing camaraderie. Although the challenge was not organized by Rotary, they were the end beneficiaries, and the final pleasure for 47 of the group was to donate their bikes to the three Alice Springs Rotary Clubs – in excess of \$40,000 worth.

The next adventure? – who knows after the ribs heal!

Looking for an International Project to support?

The Rotary Club of Bundaberg East is supporting the ASK program, Aussies Serving in Korando (Kenya), as an international project that will have great benefits to a poverty stricken area. ASK is a faith-born mission that grew in the heart of a nurse named Maryanne Cooper, which aims to eradicate poverty by raising awareness, funds and aid to meet the community's needs for growth and development and to achieve sustainable outcomes.

The ASK program has identified a clean water project to be developed for the township of Kisumu, Kenya. This will see the construction of a gravity piped water supply with its sources at Ogongo springs in Kandalo village near Ogongo Primary School.

The supply will include the construction of a weir and sump across Ogongo Spring, two tanks at the intake to serve as settling and pressure building for the gravity line, two storage tanks at two different points and repair of the existing pipeline.

Having clean piped water is seen as a goal towards the direction of reducing mortality due to contaminated water in an area where there are seven schools, a medical research institute, prison and three major industries.

The project will cost 929,425KES = \$12,755.60USD = \$16,572.52AUD.
